each other; just as God has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in the one body. And be thankful.



# Update on our Syrian Newcomer Families

### **Update for REFUGE – April 2017**

It has been 18 months since the three (3) al Diab families arrived in Winnipeg on October 5, 2015, to settle in Winnipeg. As you can well imagine, there are many things to learn and to accept when one arrives as a refugee/newcomer to Canada. The Steering Committee, members of REFUGE, neighbours and friends have guided them in their settlement - navigating the bus system, shopping, rental responsibilities, banking and taxes, computer and telephone agreements, school registration and reports card, sports and recreation, the medical, dental and optometrist systems, and so on. Kamal and Fatima, Fadel and Huda, and Jalal and Taghrid and their 18 children have worked through the challenges and in most respects are settled and flourishing.

Soccer remains a highlight for the adults and children alike. Several of the children played indoor soccer all winter, and are eager to play in spring and summer games. Jalal is playing in the Men's Senior Soccer League. Everyone watches world soccer on the television. Sledge hockey has given Omar an opportunity to excel. He is a member of the Manitoba team that will compete in the Canadian Championships in Montreal in May. Several of the children have shown talent and interest in the arts. A few are regular participants in the Arts City programming; others participate in school band and choral programs.

The children are healthy and growing rapidly. This is making space in their homes a little tight. Jalal and Taghrid found and moved to a townhouse in St. Vital, which provides more bedroom and living space. The other couples are also considering moves, but have not yet

found a suitable place. Four of the adults have their learner driving license; the other two adults and Khaled (the oldest boy) are currently preparing to take the learner's test. REFUGE was financially responsible for the families for one year, ending October 5, 2016; settlement support has continued when needed. Although the adults have been attending English classes, their facility with English is not sufficient for work, as yet. While they continue taking English classes and workshops regarding workplace safety and workplace basic skills/culture, their income support is through Employment and Income Assistance. One financial challenge that all three families have is the repayment of their flight loans to the Federal Government. The monthly

payments are spread over several years.

We have applied to sponsor two more families of Syrian refugees currently living in Beirut, Lebanon. Like the previously sponsored families, these families are relatives of Fadila al Diab, long-time resident of Winnipeg. The new applications are for Fadila's brother Talal, his wife Ahlam, and their two daughters Najah (age 1 year) and Deema (born in Feb 2017), as well as Fadila's mother Wadha, her sister Jalila, and Jalila's son Alaudin (age 4 years). As members of REFUGE, Debby Lake and the First Unitarian Universalist Church of Winnipeg are taking the settlement lead on these sponsorships. At this point, REFUGE feels we have sufficient funds to support these applications. We are, however, still accepting donations in case of unexpected additional expenses with these families. As planned, any funds remaining after the settlement will go to support other refugees.

# **Outreach Update**

The new applications were submitted by REFUGE as a Community Group to Citizenship and Immigration Canada (CIC) in July 2016. In January 2017, CIC opened files for all the applicants. We are waiting to hear from CIC about dates for interviews, medical and security checks in Beirut. Both families continue to live in precarious circumstances in Beirut, where they are not permitted to work. The monthly financial support they receive from the United Nations High Commission on Refugees (UNHCR) has been cut back to a very small amount, and they receive some additional financial and emotional support from their family members in Canada. We look forward to welcoming these 7 people to Winnipeg, where they will reunite with their extended family and start a new life in safety and security.

The al Diab families have often expressed their gratitude for all the people who have supported them over the past year and a half—financial and material donations, time and hospitality. The REFUGE Steering Committee also thanks you for your generosity.
